Welfare Awareness Topic: Forced Marriage

Overview – Forced marriage is when you face physical pressure to marry (for example, threats, physical violence or sexual violence) or emotional and psychological pressure (e.g., if you're made to feel like you're bringing shame on your family).

You have the right to choose who you marry, when you marry or if you marry at all. No one should force you or coerce you in to doing anything that you do not want to do. Forced marriage is illegal in England and Wales, and forcing someone to marry can result in a sentence of up to 7 years in prison.

This includes:

- taking someone overseas to force them to marry (whether the forced marriage takes place)
- marrying someone who lacks the mental capacity to consent to the marriage (whether they're
 pressured to or not)

To protect yourself you can apply for a Forced Marriage Protection Order, a forced marriage protection order can help if you are **being forced into marriage**, or **already in a forced marriage**.

A forced marriage protection order is unique to each case and contains legally binding conditions and directions that change the behaviour of a person or persons trying to force someone into marriage. The aim of the order is to protect the person who has been, or is being, forced into marriage. The court can make an order in an emergency so that protection is in place straightaway. The court can make a forced marriage protection order to protect a person facing forced marriage or who has been forced into marriage.

Applications for forced marriage protection orders can be made at the same time as a police investigation or other criminal proceedings. Someone who disobeys a court order can be sent to prison for up to 2 years for contempt of court - but breach of a forced marriage protection order is also a criminal offence with a maximum sentence of 5 years' imprisonment.
